Unusual Outbreaks

All unusual outbreaks are reportable by fastest means possible (FMP), as defined in the <u>Alberta Outbreak Response</u> <u>Protocol</u>, to Alberta Health and an Alberta Outbreak Report Form (AORF) must be submitted.

Routine Outbreaks

All routine outbreaks are reportable by submission of an AORF.

NOTE: Refer to the Public Health Disease Management Guidelines for COVID-19 and Seasonal Influenza for specific outbreak reporting requirements.

AORF Report Submission Timelines	
Section 1 – Initial Notification	For all outbreaks send AORF within 24 hours after opening the investigation
Section 2 – Laboratory Confirmed Organism Identification	As soon as the causative organism has been confirmed on a laboratory report.
Section 3 – Final Report	Within 2 days of closing the investigation. The final report may include additional corrections or changes in Sections 1 and 2.
Outbreak Summary	As soon as it is available (if applicable). In complex outbreaks it is expected this may take some time, however, the summary should be submitted no later than 30 days after closing the outbreak investigation.

Outbreaks (EI#) where an AORF will not be submitted:

There are some instances where an EI# may be opened and it is determined that no AORF will be sent into Alberta Health. Examples may include blood borne pathogen lookback/traceback investigations or outbreaks associated with travel to a location outside of Alberta. Notification to the Alberta Health email (cd.data@gov.ab.ca) of the following is required:

- El#
- Suspected or confirmed (if known) organism.
- The reason why the EI is not being reported on an AORF (e.g., EI is a lookback, EI is a travel-related outbreak).

Reporting "Not an Outbreak" on Final AORF:

When an initial AORF has been submitted and upon further investigation, it is determined not to be an outbreak, a final AORF with the resolution status of "Not an Outbreak" must be submitted to Alberta Health. The reason for "Not an Outbreak" should be clearly stated in the Outbreak Summary/Comments field.

NOTE: If a local outbreak occurs as a result of travel-associated cases/outbreak, THEN an AORF submission to Alberta Health is required.

⁽¹⁾ These definitions are not intended to have legal interpretations. They provide a short explanation of the terms used or instructions of how to complete the form in order to maximize consistency with data collection.

⁽²⁾ For the purpose of this document, any reference to 'clients' refers to patients, students, childcare attendees, restaurant patrons, hotel guests and other individuals (other than site staff) relevant to the outbreak. Examples provided in this document are not all-inclusive. They are included to provide guidance to the person completing the form. Please refer to disease specific case definitions in the <u>Alberta Public Health</u> <u>Disease Management Guidelines</u> for identifying confirmed, probable and suspect cases.

Care Facility: includes select populations who spend a significant amount of time in a common setting. (e.g., Acute Care, Long-Term Care facility (Facility Living), Supportive Living/Home Living, Correctional Facility, dormitory, school, childcare centre, homeless shelters, etc.).

Non-Care Facility: includes populations not categorized under Care Facility (e.g., community, community /organization function, private dwelling, permitted/approved food establishment, personal services, restricted function, swimming pool, etc.).

Data Field	Definition
El # - Exposure Investigation Number	The unique exposure investigation (EI) number assigned by the Provincial Laboratory for Public Health (ProvLab) or by the Zone that is specific to the outbreak being reported.
PHAC Event #	The unique EI number assigned by the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) when a multi-jurisdictional outbreak is opened.
Onset Date	The date that symptoms first appeared in the index case(s).
Date Investigation Opened	The date that Public Health initiated the outbreak investigation.
FNIHB Location Reporting	The First Nations and Inuit Health Branch (FNIHB) community in the Alberta Health Services (AHS) zone where the outbreak is occurring.
Date Reported to Alberta Health	The date the initial outbreak information was submitted to Alberta Health.
Primary Investigator	Name of primary contact for the outbreak in the AHS zone or with FNIHB.
Telephone Number	Phone number for the primary investigator in the AHS zone or with FNIHB.
Suspected Organism	Indicate the most <u>likely</u> cause of the outbreak from appropriate dropdown lists provided. If it is not possible to make a selection from the dropdown box (based on presenting symptoms) choose Other. (e.g., Other, - Gastrointestinal Illness; Other, Respiratory Illness; or Other, Rash) as appropriate.
Outbreak Setting:	Check the appropriate box based on the PRIMARY function/attraction of the setting
Acute Care Facility	Any acute care facility in the province. May be confined to a unit, floor or to the entire facility.
Addictions/Recovery Facility	A temporary residence where an individual receives substance abuse and/or mental health treatment.
Animal Facility	Any facility where animals are housed or raised for non-private use (e.g., abattoir, farm, intensive livestock operation, pet store, vet office, petting zoo, etc.).
Bingo Hall	A facility operated by a charity and licensed to conduct bingos from its own facility with no more than three events per week.
Camp – Day	A daytime program offering education, recreational and/or sporting activities for adults and/or children (supervised), especially in summer and during school vacations. For example, municipal programs such as kayaking, hiking, cooking, and pottery classes.
Camp – Overnight (Recreational)	Overnight recreational campground where tents/RVs etc. are temporarily placed o where a person can comfort camp (e.g., yurt or cabin rental).

Camp – Overnight (Summer/Other)	Supervised overnight camping usually for children/teens and may include, but is not limited to, individuals with special needs. May occur in summer or throughout
	the year.
Camp – Work	One or more buildings established to accommodate persons who are employed in industrial settings (e.g., mining, lumbering, construction, drilling, resource exploration or any other similar industry).
Casino	A public room or building where gambling games are played and are owned/operated by private or First Nations operators.
Child Care Facility	Site where care is provided for children (e.g., daycare center, preschool, out of
	school care, and family day-home). NOTE: This does not include residential care facilities for children under 18 years o age (refer to Facility Living)
Community	When outbreak is unrelated to a specific event or location (e.g., measles in the South zone).
Community Event – Indoor	An event or function, open to the general public, that is held indoors and is not a concert, limited time fair/festival (see Special Events definition) or indoor sporting event. Examples include but are not limited to:
	- Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) meeting
	- Church bingo
	- Craft fair
	- Indoor auction
	- Indoor flea market
Community Event – Outdoor	An event or function, open to the general public, that is held outdoors and is not a concert, limited time fair/festival (see Special Events definition) or sporting event. Includes, but is not limited to:
	Garage sale Community hall outdoor events
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Community Healthcare/Social Support setting	Sites where health and social support services are provided outside of acute care services. Sites do not provide residential care or living accommodations. Examples include, but are not limited to:
	- Community clinics
	- Private clinics (e.g., physician, dental, optometrist, counselling, physiotherapy, diagnostic imaging)
	- Support center for people living with disabilities (e.g., Kirby Center)
Concert/Event with Theatre-Style Seating	Concert or other non-sports related seated event open to the public that may or may not require ticket purchase held in an indoor or outdoor setting. Examples include, but are not limited to:
	- Dance production
	- Orchestral production
	- Theatrical production
	- Movie theatre
Correctional Facility	Facilities for incarceration. Includes, but not limited to:
	- Halfway houses,
	- Healing lodges,
	- Prisons,
	- RCMP detachment holding cell,
	- Remand centre,
	- Youth offender centre
Emergency Services	- Youth offender centre Public organizations that respond to and deal with emergencies when they occur, including police, rescue, ambulance, and firefighting services, including any work-related facilities (e.g., police gym) they use while on shift.
Emergency Services Fitness facility	Public organizations that respond to and deal with emergencies when they occur, including police, rescue, ambulance, and firefighting services, including any work-

Food Establishment – Farmers' Market	Markets that are approved by the Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry to operate as a Farmers' Market.
Food Establishment – Restaurants	An establishment where people pay to eat meals that are cooked and served on the premises. (e.g., restaurant, bar, pub, cafe, lounge). May be fast food, take out, dinein.
Food Establishment – Retail	A retail location that sells food directly to the public. Examples include, but are not limited to grocery stores, Walmart superstores, convenience stores.
Food Establishment – Other	An establishment that prepares food for sale or distribution directly to the public that does not fall into other food establishment categories. Examples include, but are not limited to caterer, institutional kitchen, soup kitchen, food bank.
Food processing facility – Meat	A plant or premises where animals are slaughtered for human consumption, or where meat or meat products are processed but not sold directly to the public. Does not include rendering plants.
Food processing facility – Other	A plant or premises where food for human consumption other than meat is processed (e.g., dairy plant, beverage packaging) but not sold directly to the public.
Group home	A supportive living facility (licensed and non-licensed) that provides meals/security for adults or children.
Industrial Setting Industrial Setting with Work Camp	Industrial workplace locations that do not have a camp on site (or other living accommodations on site for workers). Examples include, but are not limited to: - Distribution centre - Manufacture/showroom locations - Mining - Oil rig worksite - Recycling facility - Warehouse Industrial workplace locations that have a camp (or other living accommodations) on site for workers. Examples include, but are not limited to: - Construction - Drilling - Lumbering - Manufacturing - Mining - Oil Sands/Oil rig - Resource exploration - Warehouse
Long-term Care Facility (Facility Living)	Publicly funded facilities (licensed) designed specifically for individuals with complex, unpredictable medical needs who require 24-hour onsite Registered Nurse assessment and/or treatment and whose care cannot be safely provided in their own home or in supportive living. Collectively, long-term care refers to sites governed by the Nursing Homes Act and auxiliary hospitals under the Hospitals Act. Both of these settings provide publicly funded care either directly by AHS or by a contracted partner. E.g., Nursing home, auxiliary hospital, LTC unit within an acute care facility
Office Setting	A room, set of rooms, or building where the business of a commercial, government
	or industrial organization or of a professional person is conducted (e.g., bank, insurance company)
Personal Services	A facility in which any of the following activities performed on, in, or to a person's skin, hair, nails or teeth, or other parts of the body of a person, for the primary purpose of enhancing, preserving or altering the person's appearance: - puncturing - cutting - shaving

	- exfoliating
	- applying pressure
	- inserting, implanting, attaching or removing objects
	- applying suction
	- using energy-emitting equipment
	- removing
	- styling
	- applying or injecting cosmetic products
Place of Worship	A specially designed structure or space where individuals or a group of people, such as a congregation, comes to perform acts of devotion, veneration, or religious study.
Private Dwelling	A separate set of living quarters with a private entrance that does not belong to the client.
Private Indoor Social Event	Occasional and special events held indoors where only family, friends and people known to the hosts or permit holders are invited to attend, such as a birthday party, bible study, funeral reception or a wedding. Private events are not advertised or made open to the public. Information about the event may be shared with invited guests and members only.
Private Outdoor Social Event	Occasional and special events held outdoors where only family, friends and people
	known to the hosts or permit holders are invited to attend, such as a outdoor group recreational activity (e.g., dog park, hiking), birthday party, funeral reception or a wedding. Private Events are not advertised or made open to the public. Information about the event may be shared with invited guests and members only.
Retail store (Excluding Grocery)	Any retail service provider that does not require a permit to handle food as part of
	their usual business.
	Examples include:
	- Gift and specialty stores
	- Jewelry & accessories
	- Non-essential health and beauty care
	- Luggage
	- Art and framing
	- Clothing and shoes
	- Bridal
	- Gaming equipment
	- Hobby & toy

	 Businesses engaged in the retail and wholesale sale of food, pet food and supplies, and household consumer products necessary to maintain the safety, sanitation and essential operations of residences and businesses.
	- Businesses that provide essential items for the health and welfare of animals, including feed, animal food, pet food and animal supplies, including bedding.
	 Alcohol producers and/or sellers, and stores that sell beer and wine through arrangements with authorized providers; vaping stores; cannabis producers.
	 Gas stations, diesel, propane and heating fuel providers including providers of motor vehicle, aircraft and water/marine craft fuels.

School (Post-Secondary)	Any level of education after high school, including education obtained from colleges, universities, trade schools, seminaries, institutes of technology and any other facility that offers an academic degree or certificate. This includes outbreaks in any related dormitories or accommodations provided by the school and does not include permitted food establishments at these sites.
School (K-12)	A private or public primary educational institution.
	Grade: Provide the grade(s) of the ill student(s) unless the entire school is affected.
Shelter	A temporary residence or place of stay (e.g., overnight or longer) which seeks to protect vulnerable populations (e.g., homeless shelters, men's or women's shelters, Youth Emergency Center, Family Violence Emergency Shelter)
Special Event	An event open to the general public that operates for not more than 15 days within a calendar year in any one health region and includes, without limitation, fairs, festivals, exhibitions, promotional events and carnival. (e.g., Grey Cup week events, Stanley Cup Playoff events, Calgary Stampede, Heritage Festival, K-Days, Taste of Edmonton, Folk Fest, Blues Fest, Big Valley Jamboree, Country Thunder, Brooks Medieval Faire, Comic Con, International Film Festival, Taste of Edmonton/Calgary, Street Performers Festival).
Sporting Event – Indoor	A sporting event which takes place <u>inside</u> a building, and at which any spectators present are accommodated inside that building (e.g., bowling alley, recreational/professional sports game, practice or tournament, curling bonspiel)
Sporting Event – Outdoor	Outdoor physical, sports and recreational activities, including organized and informal sports, games, tournaments (e.g., soccer practice, recreational/ professional sports game, Castrol Raceway)
Supportive Living/Home Living Site	Supportive Living is a congregate setting that combines accommodation services with other supports and care. - Accommodation Services are similar to services you would receive in a hotel
	such as room, meals, and housekeeping.
	Other supports and care could include assistance with medication, bathing, dressing, and grooming.
	- There are several types of supportive living settings, the most common of which are non-designated supportive living (NDSL), seniors' lodges, designated supportive living (DSL), group homes* and private supportive living.
	*NOTE: For the purposes of surveillance, "Group Home" has its own field.
	The Supportive Living Accommodation Licensing Act defines licensed supportive living as "supportive living accommodation provided by an operator where:
	(a) the supportive living accommodation is provided to 4 or more adults who are not related to the operator,
	(b) the operator provides or arranges for services related to safety and security for the persons referred to in clause (a) in accordance with the standards set out or adopted in the regulations, and
	(c) the operator provides, offers or arranges for (i) at least one meal per day, or (ii) housekeeping services, for the persons referred to in clause (a)"
Swimming Pool/Spray Park	A pool other than a swimming pool at a private dwelling (e.g., municipal pool, hotel pools, hot tubs, wading pool).
Transportation/Conveyance	Municipal and/or public conveyance e.g., bus, train, plane, boat (e.g., cruise), ferry, rideshare (e.g., Uber), taxi, tour bus. This does NOT include private carpooling.

Primary Organism Identified	Enteric/Non-Enteric/Respiratory: The primary causative organism identified on a laboratory report from an appropriate clinical specimen, if the outbreak definition is met for that organism (e.g., a COVID-19 outbreak requires two epi-linked lab-confirmed cases of COVID-19).	
	If >1 Organisms: List all other organism(s) identified on a laboratory report from an appropriate clinical specimen, if the outbreak definition is met for that organism.	
	NOTE: If NO organism identified or NO testing done,	
	 enter All specimens tested negative OR No specimens taken. do not enter "Unknown" as a causative organism.

Species (Primary, Secondary)	This field is only used to identify the strain differentiation, if applicable. This includes all forms of differentiation (e.g., serotype/serogroup, sequence type, subtype, phagetype, PFGE).	
	NOTE: This field should be left blank if NO species information available/applicable.	
Onset Date of Last Case	The date that symptoms appeared in the last case reported for the outbreak.	
Date Investigation Closed	The date the investigation was completed.	
Other AHS Zones/FNIHB where cases have been identified	All <u>other</u> AHS zones/FNIHB locations affected in the outbreak, aside from the AHS zone/FNIHB location reporting the original outbreak (i.e. this AORF).

Is this outbreak part of a larger national or international outbreak?	The outbreak is part of a larger national or international outbreak investigation. If 'Yes', list all locations identified, including the locations identified on the initial notification under Location (Facility Name in Section 1).
Is the source of the outbreak likely environmental?	Indicate Yes (if environmental), No (if person-to-person), or Unknown as appropriate. Environmental source refers to a non-person source such as a food, water, or animal source.
If Yes, what is the environmental source?	Complete this section only if the source of the outbreak is considered environmental. Indicate the environmental source as appropriate.
Animal	Any living thing that is not human or plant (e.g., insects, birds, fish and includes domestic pets, livestock and wild animals).
Drinking Water	Potable water intended for human consumption, including private water systems (e.g., wells, cisterns, small distribution systems) and treated municipal water.
Food (Human)	Any substance, including ice, intended for use in whole or in part for human consumption, but does not include a drug, medication or a regulated health related product and, for the purpose of disease reporting, does not include drinking water.
Food (Pet)	Any substance intended for use in whole or in part for animal consumption (e.g., feeder mice, pig ear treats).
Recreational Water	Water that is neither drinking water nor swimming pool water (e.g., beach, lake, stream).
Swimming Pool	Water from a pool, wading pool, water spray park and whirlpool that has a permit issued under Section 4 of the Swimming Pool, Wading Pool and Water Spray Park Regulation.
Other specify	Indicate any other environmental source of infection not already listed in the check boxes.
Environmental source resolution	Check the appropriate box to indicate the status of the source, as appropriate. Indicate:

Outbreak Summarize any unusual outbreaks (e.g., higher mortality/morbidity, severity of illness) including: Summary / A DESCRIPTION of the outbreak, including characteristics, unusual presentations, patterns or Comments scope. A list of KEY COMMUNICATIONS that were initiated such as with Alberta Health, CNPHI alerts, zonal alerts to the public including media, physician notifications and teleconferences with other zones/provincial/federal. A SUMMARY of PUBLIC HEALTH ACTIONS taken for escalating outbreaks that are over and above routine outbreak management protocols such as large immunization campaigns, post exposure prophylaxis program, changing to accelerated schedules of immunizations (e.g., pertussis vaccine offered earlier), boil water advisory issued, education or enhanced follow-up resulted in a recall of products. LESSONS LEARNED: The level of detail of the summary corresponds to how unusual, unique or large the outbreak is or its level of public health significance.
