Statutory Declaration Surviving Joint Tenant

Information Sheet

Application by Surviving Joint Tenant

An application to remove a joint tenant on a property who has passed away is regulated under the *Land Titles Act*. On the death of one joint tenant, their interest in the land passes to the other joint tenant(s) by the right of survivorship, eliminating the need for an Executor or Administrator to deal with the transfer of their interest.

What information you need

- The full *legal land description of the property (not the civic address)
- The full name and address of the person completing the application
- The full name of the deceased
- The municipality, province/state and date of death (usually contained on the certificate)
- The Death Certificate issued by Vital Statistics or the Funeral Directors Certificate
- A commissioner for Oaths
- A Statutory Declaration Re: Proof of Death may be completed by the surviving joint tenant or anyone who has knowledge of the facts.
- We require the original Certificate of Death; however, we will make a copy and return the original to you.
- You may also submit a notarized copy of the Certificate of Death in place of the original. If the death was registered in Alberta, you may provide a photocopy in lieu of an original or notarized copy.
- Fee is \$15 per title

**Legal Descriptions

Ways to find your legal description:

- from a previous copy of title
- · most tax assessment notices have it
- some taxation municipalities may be able to provide it

Alberta

- using the Land Titles SPIN 2 system search
- visiting the Land Titles survey department

Some legal descriptions are complicated and reference only portions of land. In these cases, you must be able to provide the full legal description, or the Land Titles staff will not be able to determine the correct property. It is the registrant's responsibility to ensure they have the full and accurate legal description.

Affidavit of Surviving Joint Tenant (title) \$15.00 each
