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Alberta Outbreak Reporting Form (AORF)

Definitions⁽¹⁾ and Instructions⁽²⁾

Unusual Outbreaks

The MOH (or designate) shall report all unusual outbreaks by **fastest means possible (FMP)**, as defined in the <u>Alberta Outbreak Response Protocol</u>, to Primary and Preventative Health Services (PPHS). An Alberta Outbreak Report Form (AORF) must be submitted.

Routine Outbreaks

The MOH (or designate) shall report all routine outbreaks by submission of an AORF within the required timelines outlined below.

AORF Report Submission Timelines		
Section 1 – Initial Notification	For all outbreaks send AORF within 24 hours after opening the investigation.	
Section 2 – Laboratory Confirmed Organism Identification	As soon as the causative organism has been confirmed on a laboratory report.	
Section 3 – Final Report	Within 2 business days of closing the investigation. The final report may include additional corrections or changes in Sections 1 and 2.	
Outbreak Summary/AORF Comments	As soon as it is available (if applicable). In complex outbreaks it is expected this may take some time however, the summary should be submitted no later than 30 days after closing the outbreak investigation.	

Outbreaks (EI#) where an AORF will not be submitted:

In some cases, an El# may be opened, but it is known—either at the outset or later—that an AORF will **not** be submitted. Examples include blood borne pathogen lookback/traceback investigation and outbreaks associated with travel to a location outside of Alberta. If this occurs, notify PPHS by email at cd.data@gov.ab.ca with the following mandatory information:

- EI#
- Suspected or confirmed organism (if known)
- Reason why an AORF will not be submitted (e.g., El is a lookback, travel-related outbreak).

Reporting "Not an Outbreak" on Final AORF:

If an initial AORF has been submitted and later determined not to be an outbreak, a final AORF must be submitted to PPHS. For CDOM, set the resolution status to "Not an Outbreak" and clearly state the rationale in the Outbreak Summary/Comments field.

NOTE: If a local outbreak results from travel-associated cases/outbreak, then an AORF submission to PPHS s required.

⁽¹⁾ These definitions are for guidance only. They are not intended to carry legal interpretations. They are meant to clarify terms used in the form and promote consistency in data collection.

⁽²⁾ In this document, "clients" refers broadly to individuals affected by the outbreak other than staff—for example, residents, patients, students, childcare attendees, restaurant patrons, or hotel guests. Examples included throughout are illustrative and not exhaustive. For case classification (confirmed, probable, suspect), refer the <u>Alberta Public Health Disease Management Guidelines</u>.

*Care Facility: includes select populations who spend a significant amount of time in a common setting. (e.g., Acute Care, Continuing Care Home Types A, B and C, Supportive Living Accommodation, Correctional Facility, dormitory, school, childcare centre, homeless shelters, etc.).

**Non-Care Facility: includes populations not categorized under Care Facility (e.g., community, community organization function, private dwelling, permitted/approved food establishment, personal services, restricted function, swimming pool, etc.).

El # - Exposure Investigation Number	The unique exposure investigation (EI) number assigned by the Provincial Laboratory for Public Health (ProvLab) or the Zone and is specific to the outbreak being reported. NOTE: • The format for ProvLab assigned numbers is YYYY–### for ISC (e.g., 2025-1234) or YYYY-EI-XXX in CDOM (e.g., 2025-EI-1234). • The format for Zone assigned numbers is YYYY-XXX- "A"### (XXX = Zone e.g., 2012-CAL-C111).	
PHAC Event #	The unique EI number assigned by the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) when a multi-jurisdictional outbreak is opened.	
	NOTE: An EI should be opened for a single case linked to a national outbreak and reported to PPHS.	
Onset Date	The date that symptoms first appeared in the index case(s).	
Date Investigation Opened	The date that Public Health initiated the outbreak investigation.	
FNIHB Location Reporting	The Indigenous Services Canada (ISC) community in the PCA/Alberta Health Services (AHS) zone where the outbreak is occurring.	
Date Reported to Alberta Health	The date the initial outbreak information was submitted to PPHS.	
Primary Investigator	Name of primary investigator for the outbreak.	
Telephone Number	Phone number for the primary investigator.	
Suspected Organism	Indicate the most <u>likely</u> cause of the outbreak from appropriate drop-down lists provided. If it is not possible to select from the dropdown box (based on presenting symptoms) choose Other, Gastrointestinal Illness; Other, Respiratory Illness; or Other, Rash as appropriate.	
Outbreak Setting:	Check the appropriate box based on the PRIMARY function/attraction of the setting.	
Acute Care Facility	A provincially funded health care facility that provides short-term, episodic medical and surgical treatment, including emergency care, inpatient care, and specialized services. Outbreaks may be confined to a specific unit, floor, or involve the entire facility.	
Addictions/Recovery Facility	A residential setting, licensed or unlicensed, where individuals reside temporarily while receiving support for substance use and/or mental health concerns.	

Animal Facility	Any facility where animals are housed, raised or handled for non-private or commercial purposes. Examples include, but are not limited to: • Abattoirs, • Farms, • Intensive livestock operations, • Pet stores, • Veterinary clinics, • Petting zoos.
Bingo Hall	A facility where regularly scheduled licensed bingo events are typically held for fundraising purposes.
Camp – Day	A supervised daytime program offering educational, recreational or sporting activities for adults and/or children. Common during summer or school breaks. (e.g., municipal day camps for kayaking, hiking, cooking, arts and crafts)
Camp – Overnight (Recreational)	A site where individuals stay overnight in tents, RVs, or fixed shelters such as cabins or yurts for leisure or vacation purposes. Often includes comfort camping amenities.
Camp – Overnight (Summer/Other)	A supervised overnight camp, typically for children or teens. These camps may operate seasonally (e.g., summer) or year-round.
Camp – Work	A temporary residential facility that houses workers employed in industrial sectors such as mining, oil and gas, construction, drilling, lumbering, or resource exploration. Usually located near remote work sites.
Casino	A public facility where gambling activities are conducted, operated by either private or First Nations organizations under license. Includes games of chance such as slot machines, table games, and electronic gaming terminals
Child Care Facility	Site where care is provided for children (e.g., daycare center, preschool, out of school care, and family day-home). NOTE: This does not include residential care facilities for children under 18 years of age (refer to Facility Living)
Colony	A rural, communal living settlement with shared resources and governance, typically organized around farming and manufacturing. For the purposes of this form, "Colony" refers specifically to Hutterite colonies in Alberta.
Community	When outbreak is unrelated to a specific event or location (e.g., measles in the x town or South Zone).
Community Event – Indoor	An event or function, open to the public that takes place indoors and is not a concert, limited time fair/festival or indoor sporting event (see <i>Special Events</i> or <i>Sport Event – Indoor</i>). Examples include, but are not limited to: • Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) meeting, • Church bingo, • Craft fair, • Indoor auction, • Indoor flea market.
Community Event – Outdoor	An outdoor event or gathering open to the public that is held outdoors and is not a concert, limited time fair/festival or sporting event (see <i>Special Events</i> or <i>Sport Event – Indoor</i>). Includes, but is not limited to: • Garage sale, • Community picnics or outdoor gatherings hosted by a hall or local group.
Community Healthcare/Social Support setting	A non-residential site where health or social support services are provided outside of acute care. These settings do not include facilities where clients live or receive 24-hour care. Examples include, but are not limited to to: • Community clinics, • Private clinics (e.g., physician, dental, optometrist, counselling, physiotherapy, diagnostic imaging), • Support centers for people living with disabilities (e.g., Kirby Center).

Concert/Event with Theatre- Style Seating	A seated non-sporting event open to the public, held indoors or outdoors and may or may not require tickets. Examples include, but are not limited to: • Dance production, • Movie theatre, • Music singer/band, • Orchestral production, • Theatrical production.
Continuing Care Home Type A	A publicly funded, licensed facility providing 24-hour onsite registered nurse (RN) and/or registered psychiatric nurse (RPN) care, along with personal care from licensed practical nurses (LPNs) and health care aides (HCAs).
	Residents typically have complex or unpredictable medical needs that cannot be safel managed at home or in a Type B setting. For more information see Alberta.ca .
	Formerly: Long-Term Care, nursing homes, or auxiliary hospitals.
Continuing Care Home Type B	A publicly funded, licensed facility offering accommodation, meals, and 24-hour onsite personal care by HCAs, with LPNs and registered nursing support (onsite or on-call) based on resident needs.
	Suitable for individuals with moderate health care needs who require support but not the intensive care level of a Type A facility. Includes Secure Space units for residents with dementia. For more information see Alberta.ca .
	Formerly: Designated Supportive Living (DSL 3, 4, or 4D Dementia).
Continuing Care Home Type C	A publicly funded, licensed hospice setting providing palliative or end-of-life care, delivered by an interprofessional team—including nurses, HCAs, social workers, and others.
	Admission is typically reserved for individuals approaching the end-of-life phase, ofter within the last months or weeks. For more information see Alberta.ca .
	Formerly: Publicly funded hospice care settings.
Correctional Facility	A secure facility used for the detention, supervision, or rehabilitation of individuals in custody. Includes, but not limited to:
	 Halfway houses and healing lodges, if applicable, Prisons and remand centres, RCMP detachment holding cells, Youth offender centers.
	NOTE: Includes both temporary holding facilities and long-term incarceration sites
Emergency Services	Public-sector organizations that provide emergency response, including police, fire, ambulance, and rescue services. Includes work-related facilities used during shifts, such as police gyms, station lounge or paramedic depots.

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Fitness facility	A facility that provides space or programs for exercise, sport, or physical activity, and may include social or recreational components. Includes, but not limited to:
	Workplace gyms,
	Fitness centers,
	Group exercise classes,
	Dance studios.
Food Establishment – Farmers' Market	Market approved by the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation to operate as a recognized Alberta-approved Farmers' Market, where vendors sell food and other goods directly to the public.
	NOTE: Only approved markets qualify under this definition. Refer to the list of approved markets at <u>alberta.ca</u>
Food Establishment – Restaurant	A facility where food is prepared and sold for immediate consumption. Includes dine-in restaurants, cafes, pubs, lounges, fast-food outlets, and take-out establishments.
Food Establishment – Retail Store	A commercial location where food is sold directly to consumers for off-site consumption. Examples include, but are limited to:
(including grocery)	Grocery stores,
	Superstores (Walmart, Costco),
	Convenience stores.
Food Establishment – Other	A facility that prepares or distributes food directly to the public but does not fall under restaurant, retail, or farmers' market categories. Examples include, but are not limited to to:
	Caterers,
	 Institutional kitchens (e.g., hospitals, schools),
	Soup kitchens,
¬	Food banks.
Food processing facility – Meat	A licensed plant or premises where animals are slaughtered for human consumption or where meat and meat products are processed. These products are not sold directly to the public
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	NOTE: This does not include rendering plants.
Food processing facility – Other	A plant or premises where non-meat food or beverage products are processed for human consumption but not sold directly to the public.
	Examples include dairy plants, commercial bakeries, and beverage bottling facilities.
Group home	A residential supportive living facility (licensed and non-licensed) that provides meals supervision, and/or basic care to adults or children.
	May serve individuals with physical, cognitive, or mental health needs in a shared living environment.
Industrial Setting	A worksite where industrial activities take place without on-site accommodations for workers. Examples include, but are not limited to to:
	Distribution centers,
	Manufacturing or showroom facilities,
	Mining operations,
	Oil rig worksites, Page allog a plants.
	Recycling plants,Warehouses.

Industrial Setting with Work Camp	An industrial worksite that includes on-site accommodations (e.g., dormitories, trailers, lodges) for workers. Examples include, but are not limited to:
	Construction camps,
	Drilling operations,
	Lumber camps,
	Manufacturing with housing,
	Mining,
	Oil Sands and Oil rig sites,
	Resource exploration sites,
	Remote warehouses with worker housing.
Office Setting	A room, suite, or building where commercial, professional, industrial or government business is conducted.
	Examples: banks, insurance offices, and administrative workplaces
Personal Services	A facility that offers services performed on the skin, hair, nails, teeth, or other parts of the body for the purpose of enhancing, preserving or altering personal appearance. Services may include:
	Puncturing or cutting (e.g., piercings, tattooing),
	Shaving or exfoliating,
	Applying pressure or suction (e.g., massage, cupping),
	Inserting, implanting, attaching or removing objects,
	Using energy-emitting equipment (e.g., laser treatments),
	Styling (e.g., hair, nails),
	Applying or injecting cosmetic products.
	NOTE: These services may be regulated under Alberta's Personal Services Regulation
Place of Worship	A designated structure or space where individuals or groups gather for religious, spiritual, or devotional practices.

A commercial business that sells goods directly to consumers and does not require a food Retail store (Excluding handling permit as part of its regular operations. Grocery) Examples include: Clothing, shoe, and accessory stores, Bookstores, gift shops, and art/framing stores, Home furnishings and hardware stores, Automotive and bicycle repair shops, Electronics and office supply retailers, • Cannabis retailers, vape shops, and alcohol stores, Pharmacies and health/beauty supply stores, Pet supply stores and feed providers, Safety and personal protective equipment (PPE) suppliers. NOTE: This category excludes grocery stores, restaurants, and other businesses that sell or prepare food for consumption (see Food Establishment). Shelter A temporary place of stay intended to protect and support individuals experiencing vulnerability, displacement, or crisis. Examples include: Homeless shelters. Youth emergency shelters, Family violence emergency shelters, Men's or women's shelters. Special Event A public event that occurs for no more than 15 days within a calendar year in a given location(s). This includes temporary or one-time gatherings such as fairs, festivals, exhibitions, promotional events, or carnivals. Examples include: Calgary Stampede, K-Days, Grey Cup Week events, Taste of Edmonton, Folk Fest, Blues Fest, Big Valley Jamboree, Comic Con. Heritage Festival, International Film Festival, Street Performers Festival. A sports or recreational event held entirely within an enclosed building, where participants Sporting Event – Indoor and any spectators are accommodated indoors. Examples include: Bowling alleys, Recreational or professional games and tournaments (e.g., Edmonton Stingers, Calgary Surge), Indoor sports practices, Curling bonspiels.

Sporting Event – Outdoor	An organized or informal physical activity, sport, or tournament held outdoors , typically involving participants and/or spectators in an open-air setting.

Location (Facility Name)	The name of the facility where the outbreak is occurring or is suspected to be associated.
	Unit: The specific unit within the facility where the outbreak is occurring, if applicable.
	Floor: The floor of the facility where the outbreak is occurring, if applicable.
Postal Code	The postal code of the Location (Facility) outbreak.
Is this outbreak part of a	Indicated whether the outbreak is linked to a broader national or international outbreak

Initial # of People ill

The number of clients/residents/staff experiencing symptoms at the time the outbreak is first reported.

Breakdown is as follows:

- (a) Initial number of clients/residents (including ill visitors who are outbreak cases).
- (b) Initial number of staff.
- (c) Sum total of (a) plus (b).

NOTE: These are the counts known at the **initial notification** stage.

Section 2 – Laboratory Confirmed Organism Identification

Primary Organism Identified

Enteric/Non-Enteric/Respiratory: The main causative organism identified through laboratory testing of an appropriate clinical specimen.

If >1 Organisms: List any additional organisms confirmed through laboratory testing from appropriate clinical specimens. Other organisms must also meet outbreak definition.

Section 3 - Final Report

Species (Primary, Secondary)

Record the species of the identified organism, along with any strain-level differentiation where available.

This includes all applicable forms of subtyping, such as:

- Serotype / Serogroup,
- Sequence Type (ST),
- Subtype,
- Phage Type,
- PFGE pattern (Pulsed-Field Gel Electrophoresis),
- MLVA / MLST / WGS-based types (if available).

NOTE: Include both the primary species and any secondary species or strain information as reported by the laboratory.

Onset Date of Last Case

The date on which symptoms began in the most recent case linked to the outbreak.

Date Investigation Closed

The date the outbreak was declared over.

Other AHS Zones/FNIHB where cases have been identified

Indicate any additional Zones/ISC locations where outbreak-associated cases have been identified, excluding the Zone/ISC location reporting this outbreak (i.e., AORF).

Is this outbreak part of a larger national or international outbreak?

Confirm whether this outbreak was determined to be part of a broader national or international investigation. If 'Yes', list all locations identified, <u>including</u> the locations identified on the initial notification under Location (Facility Name in Section 1).

Is the source of the outbreak likely environmental?

Environmental source refers to a non-human reservoir or vehicle of transmission such as contaminated food, water, surfaces, or animal contact.

Select:

- Yes if the suspected or confirmed source is environmental (e.g., food, water, animals).
- **No** if the source is likely person-to-person transmission.
- **Unknown** if the source is undetermined.

If Yes, what is the environmental source?

Complete this section only if the outbreak source is considered environmental. Select the environmental source type as appropriate.

Animal

Any non-human, non-plant living organism including insects, birds, fish, domestic pets, livestock or wild animals.

Drinking Water	Potable water intended for human consumption. This includes municipal systems and private supplies such as wells, cisterns, and small distribution systems.
Food (Human)	Any substance, including ice, intended wholly or partly for human consumption.
	NOTE: Excludes drugs, medications, regulated health products, and drinking water.
Food (Pet)	Any substance intended for animal consumption, including commercial or raw products (e.g. feeder mice, pig ear treats).
Recreational Water	Natural water sources used for recreation that are not treated or regulated (e.g., rivers, lakes, beaches, streams).
Swimming Pool	Water from regulated aquatic facilities such as pools, wading pools, water spray parks or whirlpools that operate under a permit issued under Section 7 of the Public Swimming Pools Regulation.
