

# Land & Property Rights Tribunal Mediation Fact Sheet

#### What is mediation?

Mediation provides an opportunity for parties to meet, discuss and resolve their disputes through an informal process. An LPRT member with expertise in mediation facilitates these discussions.

### Why mediation?

- Fast It can be scheduled quickly and requires little preparation time. The LPRT dedicates Thursdays for hosting mediations.
- Free There are no fees for LPRT's mediation services.
- Flexible & Informal The rules are common sense: come in with an open mind, in good faith and with an intention to have a conversation and compromise to allow for a potential resolution.
- Costs less than a hearing Less time and preparation is needed. Parties can agree to mediate without extensive documentation or expert reports.
- Helps restore & maintain working relationships – Improves relations between industry and landowners.
- There is no downside If the parties cannot agree, the matter will proceed to a formal hearing.
- Confidential Mediations are not open to the public and all participants are required to sign a "Mediation Agreement" that protects confidentiality

and sets the ground rules for participants.

### How do I request mediation?

### What if the other party refuses?

Mediation is voluntary. The LPRT cannot force a party to mediate.

## Who attends mediation?

The parties themselves attend and because it is virtual, it is easy to participate. Legal counsel and other representatives may attend as well to assist the parties, however, this is not required.
